

Course Title: AP U.S Government/Economics

<u>Description</u>: This course will meet both the government and economics requirements for graduation and also prepare the student to take the AP government and politics exam, integrating it with the basic principles of economics. Students will learn the basic principles of a market economy and the role of supply and demand, and price determination. It will also include the role of the government in our economic system. Students will become familiar with the various institutions, groups, beliefs, and ideas that constitute U.S. politics. Students will view current issues in American society from a political and economic point of view. *Recommended Prerequisite: American History or AP US History*
