

Course Title: AP U.S. History

<u>Description:</u> AP US History is designed for students who wish to successfully complete the advanced placement exam administered by the College Board Advanced Placement program. Most colleges and universities grant college credit for scoring well on this exam. This course is taught chronologically with unit emphasis as follows: The years 1607 to 1789; 1790 to 1916; 1917 to the present. The course will emphasize both knowledge on a factual basis and the ability to develop concepts. Political, social, diplomatic and economic history will be emphasized. Historiography will be a part of the study within each unit. The student will be expected to use a textbook, other secondary and primary source material and take notes from lecture. Essay writing will be an important component of the course as well as document based questions (DBQs) and multiple choice quizzes and exams. These are designed to replicate components of the College Board exam that is given in May. This exam is not required but the student is encouraged to consider taking it. *Recommended Prerequisite: AP Human Geography or AP European History*
