



Course Title: Advanced Creative Writing

<u>Description:</u> Advanced Creative Writing offers highly motivated students an opportunity to study a college-level English curriculum that focuses on the techniques of writing poetry and fiction. Students will read the works of professional writers and apply the principles of imaginative writing to their own work. Students will also practice reading and responding to literature in multiple stages of the writing process. Students completing this course will also earn 3 DMACC credits for ENG 221.
