## **Checklist**

- Label Around the House: Label common items (e.g., "door," "sink") to introduce print in a natural
- Sing Songs and Rhymes: Songs introduce rhythm, rhyme, and fun language patterns.
- Tell Stories: Share family stories, which build listening and comprehension skills.

Read in Native Languages: Reading in your family's native language or dialect fosters literacy and connects children to their cultural heritage. Ask Open-Ended Questions: During conversations, ask questions like "What do you think will happen next?" to encourage critical thinking.
